LONG PLAYS XXXX

A CERTAIN RATIO "SEXTET" (FACTORY LP) --- I had almost written these guys off after the disjointed failure of "To Each ... ", but "Sextet" shapes up rather nicely. It's a moody work that reflects the pain and hurt we at times desire. Quiet but moving, ACR use the rhythmic base of funk to explore new possibilities. The mix is a real eye opener; the busy bass and percussion are prominent but never overbearing and help create a trance- like mood. Intimate and personal, the calm resonance of the vocals extend the subliminal hurt. A rewarding album that's well produced and Hannet's name is nowhere to be found. (BOZ)

D.A.F "GOLD UND LIEBE" (VIRGIN LP)--This has been described as a "sensual" album and that's very accurate. True, synthisizers and cymbals don't generate warmth for some. It's the vocals that really convey it. I can't understand a word Gebi sings because it's all in German. It's the feeling in his voice that comes across. For all I know he could be saying "go home yanks". (Craig Snyder)

TENPOLE TUDOR "LET THE FOUR WINDS <u>BLOW" (STIFF LP)</u>--- Pleasant but undistinguishable rocky British pop. "Three Bells in a Row" was a better effort but that was a single. They also dressed better back then. Buy the T-SHIRT. (BOZ)

VARIOUS ARTISTS "BUSTED AT OZ" (AUTUMN LP) --- An attractive compilation consisting of live performances by six different Chicago bands. The Effigies and Da (change your name!) fare the best while the rest (the Subverts, Naked Raygun, Strike Under, and Silver Abuse) vary in quality but ultimetly have less going for them. The Effigies are a good danceable thrash band that even "nice" people like me can dance to. Da's single from last year displayed an effective Banshees influenced sound. The two songs here don't quite reach that level although "Fish Shit" comes close. Although it's doubtful that this record will change anyone's life it's still a good bet for anyone interested in regional American underground music. (BOZ)



The lineup is rather simple consisting of bass, guitar, farfisa, and rhythm box. Unusual hooks and odd melodies attract my interest. Some of it's goofy like the guy with the long legs on the back cover but then they throw you off and do something kind of sad. Sounds like a quirky Young Marble Giants if that's possible. Recommended. (BOZ) NICK LOWE "NICK THE KNIFE" (COLUMBIA LP) --- Nick Lowe albums are like rock trivia quizzes with his good natured thievery and tongue in cheek attitude winking at you and asking "guess where I stole this from...". There isn't a thing on "Nick the Knife" that you haven't heard somewhere else but that's not the point, Nick's just tossing his pure pop elements around again and how much fun he has fitting them back together again is the point. 
VARIOUS ARTISTS "CHANTONS NOEL. GHOSTS OF CHRISTMAS PAST" (LES DISQUES DU CREPUSCULE LP)---Thirteen bands/ artists- an Xmas LP although you'd never know it by listening. Astec Camera are the only ones with the right idea I suppose, they contribute a jazzy instrumental perfect for your next holiday brunch. Why am I listening to this? "Tokyo Twilight" by the Names is haunting and makes me want to hear more. Cabaret Voltaire's "Invocation" could be an outtake from "Red Mecca". Good stuff. I'll pass on the rest .... Tuxedomoon, Durutti Column, Thick Pigeon ..... hip background music perhaps. A must if you collect LP's from small foreign countries. This (BOZ) one's from Belgium.



FINGERPRINTZ "BEAT NOIR" (STIFF LP)--These guys showed some real tuneful potential on their first two LP's. But here it's all thump- thumpthump- and- handclapping to the point that you don't care if there's some less than wretched songwriting here; that incessant BEAT obliterates everything laid under(!) it. Does this mean "Stars On 45" will be the most influential record of the 80's? Get me a razor... (Cz)

## BAD BRAINS (ROIR CASSETTE) ----

What else can I add that I haven't said elsewhere? NO this tape can never replace a live Bad Brains performance but what else can? Good reggae and some of the best thrash noise in the **Universe** make this an absolute must. Buy this, borrow it, steal it, dub it... use whatever means you have available but make sure you get it! (BOZ)



THE FLESHTONES "BLAST OFF! " (ROIR CASSETTE) --- If you bought "Roman Gods" and couldn't figure out what the fuss was about you'd be best to trade that in and pick up "Blast Off! " instead. Contrary to what NY Rocker may lead you to believe there's nothing on their latest LP that comes close to matching the material on this tape. All these selections were originally produced for Red Star in 1979. What we have is a raw vital bar band that was capable of pushing 60's R&B and psychedelicia to the MAX. The Tones may not have an inch of originality in them but they steal from all the right sources. Trashy but brillant dance music. What went wrong? (BOZ)

NON EROTIC MALE BONDING "TORTURE"/ "THE MIDDLE YEARS" (GREEN 7") ---NEMB are from D.C. and include two members from the Stick Figures. Cool textural rhythm sounds similar to the Stick Figures but different. "Torture" aptly describes it's slow hypnotic funk beat; compelling and not at all painful. "The Middle Years" is more upbeat: a mechanical rhythm section and a wonderfully dissonant guitar create some very demanding but listenable music. An incredible record, I just wish it was longer with 4 songs on it like the Stick Figures EP so that we could have become better acquainted. (BOZ)

GET SMART: "WORDS MOVE" (SYNTAX 7" <u>EP</u>)--- Clean sparce sounds with a sharp angular beat. Top honors go to S.O.A. and Minor Threat. Why Henry left S.O.A. to join Black Flag is a mystery to me. There's nothing on the new Flag LP that comes close to the fuzzed out manical (not mechanical) intensity of S.O.A. Maybe Henry wanted to be a star. The first Minor Threat BP is excellent D.C. hardcore but "In My Eyes" comes close to transcending that genre entirelly. They take everything to the extreme; the accelerated tempos, the quick stop and go time changes. the crazed guitar work ... a screaming mad wall of noise. It seems more than a coincidence that the latest Dead Kennedys takes a similar approach. Jello's been obviously influenced by the D.C. sound. The Teen Idles were an early version of Minor Threat (well they had 2 of the same guys) and are worthwhile: a glimpse of greater things to come perhaps. Government Issue and the Youth Brigade are more straight forward, not quite as frantic, and not quite as essential as the others. If these EP's are any indication, D.C. might possibly have the best hardcore scene in America today. If interested send \$2.50 apiece/p.p. for both Minor Threat singles and the Youth Brigade to Dischord Records. 3819 Beecher St. NW, Wash. D.C. 20007. The others are currently out of stock but write anyway and maybe they will repress the stuff. (BOZ)

Screaming Sneakers

SCREAMING SNEAKERS "MARCHING ORDERS" (SCREAMING SNEAKERS 12" EP) ---- Remember when the Sneakers were considered Cichlids' clones? That was some time ago; the band has since moved to NYC and their first EP has enough ammunition to silence even their staunchest critics. Well recorded and produced, the Sneakers have an energetic power pop sound that occasionaly reminds me of early Blondie circa "Plastic Letters (thats a compliment!). However that's not an accurate description as some of the material is a bit more adventurous similar to the Banshees. "Violent Days" is my favorite, it features loud guitars and Lisa Nash (lead vocalist) at her most convincing. Of special interest is their cover of "I Can't Help It", the old Reactions tune. Why didn't the Reactions version sound like this on their own EP? Yes! I think I could fall in love with Lisa if only she didn't have those tatoos .... but I guess that's my hangup. Silly isn't it? XTC "SENSES WORKING OVERTIME"/"BLAME THE WEATHER "/"TISSUE TIGERS" (VIRGIN 7") --- This one comes in a picture sleeve that's as inconvenient as it is clever-things going in all directions that folds into one tidy cover that's impossible to get the record out of. The A-side isn't much different with its odd, vaguely Indian sounding textures and rhythmns meshing into a hooky sing-song chorus. It works, really. On the flip, "Tissue Tigers(the Arguers)" is straightforward XTC(is that a contradiction?) pop that could have been an A-side as well, and Colin Mouldings tune "Blame The Weather"is amiable enough Istening fare, but I can't remember what it sounds like. (CZ)

SUBVERTS "INDEPENDENT STUDY" (CLANDESTINE 7" EP)--- Rather

routine hardcore from Chicago, the Subverts can also be heard on the "Busted at Oz" LP reviewed elsewhere. Stronger production would help although "Radiation Nation" is decent Damned influenced punk. (BOZ)

PYLON "M-TRAIN"/"CRAZY" (DB 7") ----From the cover (featuring a prism sticker of a jumping fish ... you know that kind that are usually plastered on trucks) to Vanessa's wild voice this is a neat single. Pylon seems to be more accessible, without losing any of their mystery. They still sound spooky and dangerous. "M-Train"features Vanessa providing the woo-oo of a train gone almost out of control. "Crazy" sounds like a lively dirge of a mental patient about to give up and give in to her illness. This is another quality record from DB recs, a label to be (Mary) supported!

THE DANCING CIGARETTES (GUICHER 7" EP) --- Their press release describes this as "mental theatre dance music". Well I'm not sure what that means but the Cigarettes do bear some resemblence to Pere Ubu back in their early days. Good forceful funked up tunes and a squealing sax on "Mr. Morse" make this worthwhile. The Cigs are from Indiana and can also be heard on "Red Snerts" an Indiana compilation on Gulcher. (BOZ)

The mue sic sets the scene, weaves in and out of the story line punctuating the words and actions, and sadly trails off at t end/ Rhoda has a fine voice. She plays the parts of the woman and man. piping high for the first and growling low for the second. The special A.K.A. (what is left of the original specials) support the words with excellent musicianship. This is not a single for everyone. It's very disturbing because it reminds us that rape is a crime of brutal violence. This well crafted single is highly (Mary) recommended.

POPE PAUL POT "ADVENTURES IN PLASTIC TV LAND" (NO FIDELITY EP) --- From the San Francisco Bay area, the same place that gave us the Residents and the Dead Kennedys, comes Pope Paul Pot, sounding alot like the Residents with lyrics by Jellow Biafra or something like that. The standout cut is "K-K-K Carolina On My Mind"-"well the mud feels good on my leather boots, as I goosestep through the hills". Fun lyrics, but watered-down Residents music ain "t my cup of tea. (No Fidelity Records, 1029 Pardee St., Berkley CA 94710). (CZ)


VIC GODDARD "STAMP OF A VAMP"/"HEY
