


A-LIVE



Monkey Farm began the first set of their second ever gig at 11 PM in an establishment that is the closest Coral Way will likely ever get to a juke joint. Although the club's patrons were predominately gay the atmosphere was extremely comfortable for anyone. Just as well as it happens, cause the initial bursts of music obviously took parts of the audience by surprise. Those listening who had never heard anything outside the bounds of straight disco were a little shocked by the band's cross cut saw funk. The songs are all rhythm, but harder and noticeably more primitive sounding than the glossy syncopation heard all over the radio today. Monkey Farm played all original material except for Chris Kenner's "Land of 1000 Dances". The first set suffered from bad sound, but after a break, the band returned and gave an inspired performance. Visually they were happening too. Darla, late of the Hayheads, effortlessly mixing grace and abandon in her dancing and vocals, her brother James played a lot of vehement rhythm guitar with the occasional spider and fly solo. Drummer John Galway and Johnny Salton on bass upped the stakes on their already considerable talent and David Hill played tenor sax with an elegant gusto which unfortunately, never always got a fair shake from the sound system. A great night, nonetheless. Now, hopefully the band will persevere with keeping their act fresh, finding gigs, and will radiate as good a feeling as they did this time. (Frankie Twist)




